On October 22nd, 1955, the founding of the University of Toronto Chapter made Phi Delta Kappa international. Having planned the last four five-year anniversaries, we wanted the 55th to include young people, students and relatives, guests and business people. Consequently, with the agreement of our committee, Jim Youngson, Pauline Quan, Walt Winchell and President Moveta Nanton, we wrote to Craig Kielburger so see if he would accept the new Anniversary Award "**Dedicated to Those Creating a Better World Through Education**" for his founding and work in Free The Children, and to be our guest speaker. He graciously agreed, so we wrote to the Lieutenant Governor to see if he would host a reception for us. In spite of a number of events on October 28th, His Honour provided a delightful one and a half hour reception for us. Their Honours circulated, meeting many guests, hors d'oeuvres were served and a bar providing wine, tea, coffee and soft drinks was available. The Lieutenant Governor, David Onley, spoke of the value of Education and the important part Phi Delta Kappa has undertaken over the years. Derek Bate thanked him for his gracious hospitality. After dinner, we had a musical interlude with The Greytones Quartet, arranged by Jim Youngson. Many people commented on the quality of the group. Derek Bate and Harry King Fisher, Founding Members were recognized by Susan Seidman, as well fifty-year members Kenneth Payne and John Pipher. Founders Roderick Stuart MacIntosh and William Alexander McCuaig were unable to be with us but they along with fifty-year member Bruce Chambers were later acknowledged.

He received a well-deserved standing ovation. This was followed by a Q and A, efficiently moderated by Dr. Ned McKeown. Another founder, Dr. Harry Fisher, thanked Craig very eloquently.

Never have we organized an event which elicited so many beautifully-worded expressions of congratulations, so welcome after ten busy months of planning. Business people who attended were impressed to see that teachers were dedicated to their students, and Education. The young people were inspired. Above all, Craig's thank you letter expressed the fact that the 55th was an incredible success and that he is humbled to receive the inaugural award. So many of our dreams did come true!
