

Research Session Report #1 Stress in School and Life

It has been a challenge trying to shape the current series looking at issues surrounding mental health and just plain stress in school and in life.

- What tone should we set?
- How personal can we get?
- Who should be involved in the series?

These are just some of the challenges the executive, especially the three of us on the Program Committee, faced. In September a report in the Sept. 21 issue of the *Toronto Star*: <u>Back to School: Looking beyond the 3 Rs</u> illuminated the focus.

Our first session with an audience of more than 40 Kappans and guests, many of which were student teachers at OISE and York University, began from the student voice. Nobu Chern-Warwick, a grade 12 student at Danforth Collegiate and Technical institute in Toronto, and the focus of the article, was our main presenter.

The session was dynamic as Nobu was articulate and informed beyond his years. We went over some familiar ground around issues of mental health. We also looked to possibilities for improving our mental well being from physical activities, breaks, to mindfulness and meditation sessions to working with school Safe and Caring Committees.

We also touched on the tensions adolescents face between striving for personal identity, yet conforming with their peer group importance of social and emotional development (a theme of an earlier PDK series)

Nobu passionately promoted a more holistic assessment of schools beyond test scores.

Several times we interacted with each other and with Nobu about our level of awareness and how this awareness of the need to look at mental health issues has been a recent phenomenon.

In another interactive task we talked about what we personally did to "decompress" and relieve our own stress.

Another interaction had student teachers talking about what they might do to promote mental well being in their classes.



There were actually 114 angel students participating in this program on November 20, 2014, at Christ Church in Niagara Falls, and with parents and friends in the audience the church was filled to the rafters!

There were two well-trained choirs: one from Sacred Heart Elementary, and one from St. Paul's Secondary, who brought us beautiful music. At Stamford (Collegiate) Secondary: (there were only boys in the woodworking class this year); their angel creations were artistically displayed at the altar, and then given as aifts to each school on the program.

Miss Kathie's Just Dance Academy offered a breathtaking program of Lyrical, Tap, and Jazz presented by very young to teen-age dancers. Our soloist from Christ Church who is a now a student at St. Michael's Secondary brought tears to the eyes of the audience with his solo "Hail Mary, Gentle Woman".

Teachers from Niagara Falls, N.Y. brought us pictures and stories of angels from 34 students ages 6 and 7 from St. Stephen's School in Grand Island, N.Y. We were touched by their accounts and beliefs: Included were:

"My angel listens when I pray, my angel watches me every day."

"There is an angel in your head, ...even if you can't see them they are always there."

"I saw an angel taking my cat away when she died."

Each school was presented with certificates from the Mayor, M.P.P., M.P. (who is also the Minister of Defence for Canada); from the University of Toronto Chapter of PDK International Educators; and the Canadian Federation of University Women - Niagara Falls Club, which also offered stipends to the academic schools.

"Special PDK personalized certificates were prepared by Kappan Carolyn Moras, and the students were thrilled with the remarks: this made them feel so special and important! They clapped and cheered!

Following the program the Christ Church Rector, Fr. Paul Maynard offered appreciation and the Blessing. The reception following was enjoyed by all.
