The Trinity Chamber Ensemble

The Trinity Chamber Ensemble is a string orchestra, which has no brass section. They do however have occasional guest artists playing such things as oboe, harp, etc., depending on the music selected.

The Ensemble playlist spans a wide range of musical eras . They play Renaissance, Baroque, Classical, Romantic, Post Romantic, and modern music. They have also debuted a special commission, conducted by the composer. The choice of music varies according to the program put together by the concertmaster. The position of concertmaster rotates among three members of the Ensemble. One audience member noted that at each concert she heard a few pieces from composers she knew, and a few pieces from composers who were new to her.

The connection between PDK and the Chamber Ensemble is a very close one, intimate even. John Milosh, concertmaster of the October concert, is PDK member Mary El Milosh's husband. John has been Head of Music at York Memorial High School. He has been Principal Second violinist for the Georgian Bay Symphony, which has been playing continuously for over 51 years. John is currently working with other members to establish the Georgian Bay Symphony School of Music, as well as playing with the Trinity Chamber Ensemble. He characterizes his work with the Trinity Chamber Ensemble as "having a string quartet feel expanded a bit. " Each of the players support each other and each is vitally necessary. Kappan Discussion

2004 Jackman Award awarded to OISE-UT student

The 2004 Jackman Award was presented to Shenyu Huang at the yearend social for UT Chapter PDK held on June 2nd at scenic Bluffer's Restaurant in Scarborough. Shenyu is studying for her master's degree at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education of University of Toronto. She teaches English as a Second Language for York Region School Board and is working to be an official Mandarin translator for the Toronto District School Board.

The Jackman Award, named after University of Toronto chapter's first president Henry Jackman, is unique to our chapter. The award is open to students at Ontario faculties of education and education programs. The Jackman Award was established by John Carrick, a founding PDK Chapter member. Former chapter president Carole Benson coordinated the award process last year.

This year the award is being coordinated by long time PDK member John Myers. John was a social studies consultant for many years for the former Toronto Board of Education before moving to the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education. He has edited Orbit Magazine, which reports on research issues. John intends to involve his students at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education in developing the essay topics. Information will be sent to education faculties and programs, and will be posted on the PDK JUT Web site.
